Highlights Include:

- o Not limited by the amounts deferred into the Phoebe 403(b)
- o Plan is subject to annual deferral limits set by the IRS
- o Per IRS regulations, each participant is a general unsecured creditor of the plan sponsor.

An eligible Employee is one who is determined by the Employer to be a member of a select group of management or highly compensated employees within the meaning of Sections 201(2), 301(a)(3), and 401(a)(1) of ERISA.

Supplemental Executive Retirement Plan (SERP) 457(f):

The organization relies on an independent compensation committee, independent compensation consultant, surveys, well documented methods and board approval to establish total compensation of the CEO and executive officers. Certain board approved employees are eligible to participate in a SERP that provides certain defined annual pay credits that are subject to a substantial risk of forfeiture. The purpose of the SERP is to provide a long-term incentive and retirement benefit for affected executives consistent with the benefit available to employees not impacted by IRS

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compensation limits on defined benefit plans. The amounts reported as supplemental executive retirement compensation for eligible employees in Schedule J represent credited, but not vested, benefits, and the amounts are available in future periods to the employee subject to continuing employment. PPHS maintains ownership of the funds allocated to each participant until vesting and payment.

For a participant in the SERP prior to 1/1/2017 (a "grandfathered participant"), with pay credits for plan years beginning prior to 1/1/2020, the initial vesting date will occur on the date the participant attains five years of participation under the plan. After the initial vesting date, a grandfathered participant shall have a new vesting date once every 5 years. These additional vesting dates will occur on the 5th anniversary of each vesting date after the initial vesting date. On each vesting date, a grandfathered participant will become 100% vested in an amount equal to the participant's account balance reduced by any pay credits credited to the account for the 2 most recent plan years. Grandfathered participants with pay credits for plan years beginning on or after 1/1/2020, each year's annual pay credit plus subsequent earnings and/or losses will vest after 5

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years of continuous employment. Each contribution is subject to a separate and independent 5 year continuous employment requirement.

For participants initially participating in the SERP after 12/31/2016 (a "contemporary participant"), each year's annual pay credit plus subsequent earnings and/or losses will 100% vest on that pay credits' 5th anniversary, provided that the participant remains in the continuous employment throughout the 5-year period for each annual pay credit.

If any eligible participant attains normal retirement age prior to separation from service, they shall vest in 100% of the account balance.

Once vested, each participant shall receive a distribution of their entire vested amount within a reasonable period not to exceed 2.5 months. This distribution is treated as reportable compensation to the participant and is included in Part II, Column B(iii). Therefore, Part II, Column B(iii) includes prior year SERP deferrals previously reported in Part II, Column C. Any distribution amount included in Part II, Column B(iii) that was previously reported in prior periods as deferred compensation in Part II, Column C is disclosed in Part II, Column F. Phoebe Putney Health System, Inc. (Corporation) is a not-for-profit health care organization that was formed to serve as the parent organization of a group of affiliated entities and as such, its primary purpose is to plan, coordinate, and direct the group and to provide centralized administrative and management services to the exempt entities in the group. The Corporation is recognized as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is classified as a public charity under Section 509(a)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Currently, the affiliated entities comprising the group include: Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital, Inc. (PPMH), Phoebe Foundation, Inc. (Foundation), Phoebe Putney Health Ventures, Inc. (Health Ventures), Phoebe Physician Group, Inc. (PPG), Phoebe Putney Indemnity, Ltd., Phoebe Sumter Medical Center, Inc. (PSMC) and Phoebe Worth Medical Center, Inc. (PWMC).

As a tax exempt organization, the Corporation has no stockholders or owners. All revenue after expenses is reinvested in our mission to care for the citizens of the communities served by the Corporation and its affiliated entities and includes clinical care, health programs, state-of-the-art technology and facilities, research and teaching and training of medical professionals to meet current and future needs.

Phoebe Putney Health System, Inc. operates as a charitable organization consistent with the requirements of Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and the "community benefit standard" of IRS Revenue Ruling 69-545. The Corporation takes seriously its responsibility as the community's safety net hospital and has a strong record of meeting and exceeding the charitable care and the organizational and operational standards required for federal tax-exempt status. The Corporation demonstrates a continued and expanding commitment to meeting our mission by providing community benefits. A community benefit is a planned, managed, organized, and measured approach to meeting identified community health needs, requiring a partnership between the healthcare organization and the community to benefit residents through programs and services that improve health status and quality of life.

Through its affiliated group of hospitals, the Corporation improves the health and well-being of Southwest Georgia through clinical services, education, research and partnerships that build health capacity in the community. Each hospital provides community benefits for every citizen in its service area as well as for the medically underserved. The hospitals conduct community needs assessments and pay close attention to the needs of low income and other vulnerable persons and the community at large. The Corporation often works with community groups to identify needs, strengthen existing community programs and plan newly needed services. In addition to providing free and discounted services to people who are uninsured and underinsured, the Corporation provides a wide-ranging array of community benefit services designed to improve community and individual health and to increase access to health care. The Corporation's excellence in community benefit programs was recognized by the prestigious Foster McGaw Prize awarded to the hospital in 2003 for its broad-based outreach in building collaboratives that make measurable improvements in health status, expand access to care and build community capacity, so that patients receive care

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closest to their own neighborhoods. Drawing on a dynamic and flexible structure, the community benefit programs are designed to respond to assessed needs and are focused on upstream prevention.

As Southwest Georgia's leading provider of cost-effective, patient-centered health care, the Corporation's affiliated hospitals participate in the Medicare and Medicaid programs and are among the leading providers of Medicaid services in Georgia.

The following table summarizes the amounts of charges foregone (i.e., contractual adjustments) and estimates the losses (computed by applying a total cost factor to charges foregone) incurred by the affiliated hospitals due to inadequate payments by these programs and for indigent/charity. The following is a summary of the community benefit activities and health improvement services offered by the hospitals and illustrates the activities and donations during fiscal year 2025.

I. Community Health Improvement Services

A. Community Health Education

The Corporation's affiliated hospitals provided health education services that reached 10,080 individuals in 2025 at a cost of \$419,203. These services included the following free classes and seminars:

- Teen Pregnancy Prevention Education
- Teen Parenting Classes (Network of Trust)
- CPR Training to Teachers
- Safe-Sitter Classes
- Asthma & Epi-Pen Education
- Health Education at Summer Camps
- Shop Talk discussions related to Prostate Cancer and Diabetes
- Health Lay-worker training
- Various Cancer Specific Seminars and presentations
- The Ribbon Walk
- Project Elevation Prostate Cancer Screening Initiative

Men's and Women's Health Conferences

The PPMH's men's and women's conferences attracted a total of 647 participants. In June, the Men's Conference attracted 250 participants. The 2025 Men's Health Fair was a screening event that provided prostate cancer screening, blood pressure and glucose checks, Education on lung health wellness and primary care was also provided. The Women's Conference was held in October 2024 and had 397 participants. The Women's Conference focused on breast, lung, and colorectal cancer and screenings for cholesterol, glucose, and blood pressure were provided. The total cost to the organization for the two conferences and other community health education events was \$100,398.

The PSMC children's and men's health conferences attracted a total of 525

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participants. In August, the Children's Health Conference attracted 250 participants. Children ages 5-17 were screened for weight, BMI and blood pressure. In November, the Men's Conference attracted 88 participants. This fair was a screening event that provided prostate cancer screening, blood pressure and glucose checks. In February, PSMC held its annual Heart Awareness Walk & Run that attracted 187 participants. Participants were given a chance to have blood pressure screenings as well as access to heart healthy information from PSMC's local cardiologist's office. The total cost to the organization for the two conferences and other community health education events was \$47,866.

Network of Trust

This is a nationally recognized program aimed at teen mothers to provide parenting skills, attempt to reduce repeat pregnancies, and complete high school. Internal evaluations show teens participating in the program are less likely to repeat a pregnancy prior to graduation. Network of Trust enrolled 3 teen parents (with zero repeat pregnancies) during the 2024/2025 school year. Program results demonstrate teens that graduated from the two-semester program are less likely to have a second pregnancy prior to age 21. Additionally, Network of Trust and the school nurse program provided teen pregnancy prevention programming, CPR training, handwashing education, asthma and epi-pen education, Stop the Bleed Training, and conducted health education at summer camps. Health information tables were also provided at local health fairs. The total cost to the organization for Network of Trust Community outreach totaled \$270,939.

B. Community Based Clinical Services

The Corporation's affiliated hospitals provided community based clinical services that reached 31,901 individuals in 2025 at a cost of \$728,411. These services included the following free classes and seminars:

Flu Shots

The Corporation provides free flu shots to volunteers and students, and homeless shelters. In 2025, the Corporation administered 44 flu shots at an unreimbursed cost of \$572.

Mammography

PPHS provided 216 mammograms to the uninsured in 2025 at an estimated cost of \$13,001.

Lung Cancer Screenings and Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) Testing

PPHS provided 30 lung cancer screenings to the uninsured in 2025 at an estimated cost of \$2,818 and 38 PSA's to the uninsured in 2025 at an approximate cost of \$197.

School Nurse Program

The Corporation places nurses in nineteen schools in its Primary Service Area with a goal of creating access to care for students and staff, assessing the health care status of each population represented, and effectively establishing referrals for all health care needs. Nurses conducted CPR training, Safe Sitter classes, teen pregnancy prevention education, asthma and epi-pen education, Stop the Bleed training, and health education summer camps. During the 2024/2025 school year, the school nurse program covered approximately 31,473 student lives. This program operated at a cost of \$379,536 in 2025.

Nurse Family Partnership

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The Nurse Family Partnership (NFP) is a home visitation training for eligible first time moms from pregnancy until the child's second birthday. Without a variance from the National Service Office (NSO), the mom should enter the program no later than the 28th week of pregnancy. The BSN-prepared nurse provides scheduled visits throughout the pregnancy and until the child turns two. The goal of NFP is to have healthy moms having healthy babies. Phoebe's Nurse Family Partnership program has proven to be effective in improving compliance with prenatal, postpartum and infant/child medical care, and has also shown fewer preterm deliveries than counterparts not in the program. In 2025, the Corporation spent \$332,287 and provided services to 100 clients throughout the fiscal year.

Health Equity for All Teens (H.E.A.T.)

Health Equity for All Teens (H.E.A.T.) is a collaboration between Morehouse School of Medicine and 3 subcontractors across the state of Georgia. Phoebe Network of Trust is the subcontractor for the South Georgia region. The target population for this project is youth aged 10-24 in Baker, Calhoun, Dougherty, Early, Mitchell, Seminole, Terrell, Randolph and Thomas counties, with the potential to expand to additional counties. The purpose of the project is to improve optimal adolescent health, reduce sexual risk behavior that leads to teen pregnancy and STI's, and increase positive youth behaviors known to protect against teen pregnancy. Through this program, 2,337 students were reached by implementing pre-approved Evidence Based Interventions (EBI's) including: InClued, Plan A, Be Proud, Be Responsible, and Positive Potential. In addition to providing health education to students, each county formed a Youth Leadership Council (YLC) group. YLC is a team of students selected to serve as leaders in community and school projects. The 2025 fiscal year was the second of five years of this grant funded project.

C. Health Care Support Services

Although the Corporation anticipates reimbursement from various funding sources in fiscal year 2025, the Corporation wanted to highlight these life-saving benefits to the community:

Mobile Units

In fiscal year 2021 the Corporation purchased two 36-foot mobile healthcare units for \$946,869, funded through generous donations from Phoebe Foundation. These mobile units are dedicated to improving the health of our region's vulnerable residents in medically underserved communities throughout Southwest Georgia. Each unit is equipped with two examination rooms, equipped with comprehensive primary, specialty and occupational healthcare facilities. These exam rooms can accommodate full physical examinations, specimen collections, clinical vital readings, hearing examinations and respiratory testing. Each unit is equipped with Telehealth presentation site capabilities, which allow for a variety of subspecialty providers to evaluate and assess patients within the mobile unit. In addition, each unit is equipped with a wireless connectivity cradle point, allowing for real time medical documentation. Both units are self-sustainable, requiring no external electrical or water hook ups. The mobile units are designed to provide in-person primary care, virtual specialty care, and health & wellness resources in regular rotation across southwest Georgia, many of whom lack the resources to travel to service

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deliverable sites. Such access enhancements connect patients with medical professionals before an emergency room visit or hospitalization becomes necessary. Through low cost/no cost treatment, education, and referral to additional resources, the mobile clinics are able to keep potentially serious health conditions in check, helping targeted patient populations take control of their health in ways they'd never be able to otherwise. In 2025, the mobile units partnered with Albany Area Primary Health Care (AAPHC) and Medicaid providers to host primary care clinics throughout 15 rural Southwest Georgia counties. The mobile units traveled 9,494 miles sponsoring 109 wellness events with a total of 749 visits, and 29 health fairs with a total of 401 interactions.

Government Sponsored Eligibility Applications to the Poor and Needy
The Corporation contracts for eligibility on behalf of the poor and needy that may be eligible for Medicaid. In some cases, it can take up to two years to be deemed eligible. In 2025 the Corporation paid \$796,520 to process these applications with 1,013 receiving Medicaid benefits.

The Light House

The Light House housing in Albany, GA provides a comforting and supportive haven for cancer patients and their families, offering a welcoming and nurturing environment during their challenging journey towards healing and recovery. It is designed to be a home away from home. The Light House affords each guest comfort, privacy, and state of the art accommodations for them and one family member. It's conveniently located across the street from the Phoebe Cancer Center and includes six bedrooms, each with a wheelchair accessible restroom and shower. There's a commons area, a large kitchen, two quiet rooms, a veranda, sunroom and screened-in porch. The Light House provides a comfortable home-like setting where qualified patients can relax between treatments or spend the night to avoid having to travel back and forth to their home. It's a place where patients and families find solace and a caring environment during their most difficult times. The Light House was built on love and faith by the philanthropy giving from the community, survivors, and local business owners. In 2025, the Corporation spent \$8,893 on Light House facility maintenance.

The Phoebe Wellness Center

The Phoebe Wellness and Survivorship Center is a beacon of hope and support for Cancer patients, survivors and thrivers. It offers a comprehensive range of services, programs, and resources aimed at empowering survivors to thrive beyond treatment and their cancer journey. This center provides a holistic approach to physical, emotional, and mental well-being, helping survivors regain their strength, find a sense of community, and embrace life after cancer. The Wellness Center offers a diverse array of services including educational programs, fitness classes, counseling referrals, and support groups, all tailored to meet the unique needs of survivors. It serves as a sanctuary for survivors to heal, connect, share similar experiences, and rediscover a fulfilling and vibrant life, post cancer, after diagnosis, treatment and throughout survivorship and surveillance. In 2025, the Corporation spent \$9,931 on the Phoebe Wellness and Survivorship Center.

Project Elevation Initiative

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Project Elevation is an innovative, community-based initiative that strives to educate African American men on the importance of prevention, screening and early detection of prostate cancer, as well as overall health and wellness. Project Elevation was originally funded by Morehouse School of Medicine to create a community-based collaboration with local faith-based organizations and barbers to offer services and resources to community members. The community partners received intense training from the partnering healthcare organization, Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital. The partners were given the tools and resources to educate others within their inner circles and community on the importance of men's health screening guidelines. Community partners include Morehouse School of Medicine, Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital, Albany Coalition of Pastors, and local barbers. Each organization offers a distinct and valuable resource that caters to the community's specific needs. This project has allowed Phoebe to build trusted relationships with faith-based organizations and key leaders within its communities. In 2025, there were 9 screening events, and 477 men were tested in the Southwest GA area. 19 men have been diagnosed with prostate cancer since the inception of the project in 2021.

Phoebe Lights of Love Transport

Phoebe Lights of Love offers a vital transportation service specifically designed for cancer patients, providing free and reliable rides to and from their daily radiation and medical oncology treatments. For many individuals navigating the complexities of a cancer diagnosis, this service serves not just as a means of travel but as an essential lifeline during an incredibly challenging time. Our dedicated drivers, who go beyond the role of mere chauffeurs, embody kindness and compassion, acting as supportive companions who offer comfort and understanding. They ensure that every patient feels cherished and connected as they embark on their journey toward healing. Supported by the generous contributions of the Phoebe Foundation, the Lights of Love program reflects our unwavering commitment to instilling hope and promoting healing for those in need. Each day, we operate two well-equipped vans, designed to provide a safe and comfortable environment for our passengers. Our caring drivers, who understand the profound impact of their role, have successfully transported 3,042 patients this year alone, with operational costs totaling \$82,236. With each ride, our goal is to ease the burdens of treatment while fostering a sense of community, empathy, and care that our passengers can rely on during their most difficult times.

Financial Assistance Policy (FAP)

PPHS Hospital Facilities will extend free or discounted care to eligible individuals for all urgent, emergent, or otherwise medically necessary services. Patients whose household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines are eligible for free care. Patients whose household income is above 200% and below 400% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines qualify for discounted charges based on a sliding fee schedule in the FAP. Phoebe will not charge eligible individuals more for emergency or other medically necessary care than the Amount Generally Billed (AGB) to individuals who have insurance coverage, and is compliant with the requirements for a not-for-profit charitable corporation in accordance with

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Internal Revenue Service Regulation §1.501(r).

D. Social and Environmental Improvement Activities

PSMC and PPMH participated in multiple food distributions throughout 2025 and provided financial contributions to aid in community garden infrastructure. This was provided at a cost of \$45,767.

II. Health Professions Education

The Corporation recognizes that to continuously improve the Corporation's long-term value to our community and our customers, to encourage life-long learning among employees and to achieve a world-class employer status, it is in the organization's best interest to provide opportunities that will assist eligible employees in pursuing formal, healthcare related educational opportunities. PPHS also provides non-employees financial support in pursuing healthcare related degrees. In 2025, 3,623 students received clinical instruction from the Corporation's facilities at a total cost of \$8,200,834.

Nursing Students

In 2025, PPHS provided \$4,549,425 in clinical supervision and training to 2,647 nursing students.

Other Students

During fall 2024 and spring 2025, the Simulation Center trained medical residents in emergency response and labor and delivery measures. The medical residents attend training in the Simulation Center each quarter. Simulation & Innovation Center

PPMH's technologically advanced Simulation & Innovation Center is the leading provider of nurse training and development in Southwest Georgia. The Simulation & Innovation Center features a state-of-the-art skills lab and simulators for labor & delivery, NICU, pediatrics, med-surg, surgery, trauma and critical care. Students participate in full patient codes on life-like mannequins that respond to a variety of conditions. What nurses experience in the Simulation & Innovation Center will mirror what one would experience on the floor.

Other Health Professional Education

The Corporation provided an additional \$3,651,409 in clinical supervision and training to pharmacy, pharmacy techs, and other allied health professionals providing clinical opportunities for 976 students.

III. Subsidized Health Services**A. Other Subsidized Services****Inmate Care**

The Corporation provides care to persons in jail for Dougherty County. In 2025 the Corporation provided \$2,035,112 of unreimbursed medical and drug treatment to 611 inmates.

Indigent Drug Pharmacy

Indigent Drug Pharmacy provides medication upon discharge to patients that are either indigent or uninsured. In 2025, the pharmacies at PPMH, PSMC, and PWMC dispensed 3,793 prescriptions to 1,392 patients at a cost of \$285,319.

Trauma Care

Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital is currently a state designated Level II Trauma Center, providing specialized care to trauma patients every day in South Georgia. The PPMH Trauma and Emergency Center stands as a beacon of

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hope and resilience within its community, embodying a profound commitment to saving lives when every second matters. These centers are not just equipped—they are empowered—to deliver swift, comprehensive care to those experiencing traumatic injuries, serving as regional trauma hub in crisis situations when minutes matter.

Operating a trauma center requires substantial and ongoing investments to maintain readiness, deliver specialized care, and meet regulatory standards. The largest portion of costs is typically allocated to clinical medical staff, who must be available around the clock to respond to emergencies—this can represent over half of total expenses for Level II centers. Additional investments include administrative and program support, advanced medical equipment, facility upgrades, and continuous education and outreach programs. Immediate access to compassionate professionals, cutting-edge technology, and life-saving treatments can make the difference between tragedy and recovery. Beyond hospital walls, Phoebe Trauma Services ignite a spirit of safety through community outreach, injury prevention initiatives, and ongoing educational efforts in higher risk groups, schools and farming communities to make every life we touch better. During this fiscal year, Phoebe served 1,010 trauma patients for a cost to the organization of \$11,501,618.

IV. Financial and In-Kind Support

In 2025, the Corporation provided \$991,200 in cash donations and in-kind support to non-profit organizations in Southwest Georgia. Listed are some highlights:

- PPMH provided \$146,214 as a cash donation to Horizons Community Solutions for cancer screenings
- Provided forgone rent to non-profits at a cost of \$100,191.
- PWMC donated a cash contribution of \$55,000 to the Worth County Health Department for community health improvement.
- PPHS donated \$200,000 to Flint River Habitat for Humanity

V. Community Building Activities**A. Economic Development**

The Corporation supports the Economic Development Commission of Dougherty County with funding to support improved employment and health coverage as a way to improve the overall health of the residents of the region.

B. Workforce Development

To address long-standing nursing and medical occupational shortages, the Corporation spent \$890,791 in developing and expanding enrollment in nursing and other medical occupational programs in 2025. This funding was provided to Morehouse School of Medicine, Albany State University, Albany Technical College, and Ignite College and Career Academy.

Simulation Lab Other Educational Opportunities

The Corporation's \$5.3 million dollar Simulation Plan became operational in 2021. It was built to train workers in a variety of healthcare roles and duplicates hospital environments exactly, including patient and operating rooms, intensive care units, and the emergency center. The following are some training highlights for 2025:

a. Workforce Development:

Through various investments with our academic partners, the Corporation has enabled the nursing programs to increase student enrollment by providing

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funding for full and/or part-time faculty for each of the nursing programs, as well as for three full time clinical faculty who are located in the Simulation & Innovation Center.

b. Albany State University ("ASU") Summer Health and STEM Camp:

This camp provided experiential learning opportunities to high school students in the areas of biology, chemistry/physics and biomedical/healthcare fields. Students engaged in scientific experimentation and demonstrations with ASU faculty in the aforementioned areas. Additionally, students meet with keynote motivational speakers and personnel at PPMH for a tour of medical facilities. Held in the Summer of 2025, there were approximately 41 student participants.

c. Phoebe Academy for Teens in Healthcare (PATH):

The Phoebe Academy for Teens in Healthcare (PATH) is a hands-on learning experience designed to introduce high school students to careers in healthcare. Through interactive simulations, professional mentorship, and exposure to a variety of medical specialties, students gain real-world insight into healthcare professions while building leadership skills and professional connections. PATH is ideal for students who have a strong interest in healthcare and are eager to explore future career opportunities in a meaningful and engaging way. Launched in the Summer of 2025, there were 14 students that participated.

d. Clinical Instructor Training:

Student services, in collaboration with the education department hosts Clinical Instructor Training for academic partners who bring students into the facility for clinical rotations. Members of the PPMH simulation and innovation team provide demonstration and hands on training to instructors. Student services delivers information and guidelines to instructors on student expectations, policies and procedures, and high reliability protocols. In July 2025, 43 clinical instructors attended the session.

e. Phoebe Work Based Learning Internship Program:

Phoebe's High School Senior Internship Program offers students who have completed healthcare pathway coursework the opportunity to apply their classroom learning in real-world clinical environments. Through structured rotations in various hospital departments, students gain exposure to diverse healthcare roles, helping them clarify or confirm their career interests. This initiative not only deepens students' understanding of healthcare professions but also emphasizes professional development and the cultivation of essential employability skills such as communication, teamwork, and adaptability. By bridging academic preparation with hands-on experience, the program supports career readiness and strengthens the future healthcare workforce. Student Services had 15 high school seniors total from Lee County and Dougherty County that participated in 2025.

f. 4C Academy - Phoebe Health Science Pathway Internship Program:

The Phoebe High School Healthcare Internship Program provides graduating high school seniors who have previously participated in healthcare pathway programs with a structured opportunity to gain hands-on experience in clinical settings. Through this initiative, students choose between two focused tracks: a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) internship or a Medical Assistant (MA) clinic internship. This experiential learning model allows students to apply foundational knowledge, develop essential clinical

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skills, and gain exposure to real-world healthcare environments. The program is designed not only to support career readiness but also to serve as a pipeline for future employment at PPMH. Upon successful completion and graduation, students are considered for entry-level CNA and MA roles, with access to educational assistance as they pursue post-secondary degrees in healthcare. This initiative strengthens the local healthcare workforce, promotes career advancement, and supports the long-term professional development of youth in the community. There were 16 students from 4C that participated in 2025.

Simulation Lab Other Educational Opportunities, Continued

g.SOWEGA-AHEC Pathway to Medicine:

SOWEGA-AHEC, in collaboration with AAPHC and the PPMH Family Medicine Residency Program, created the Pathway to Medical School Program to address the critical need for primary care physicians in Southwest Georgia. Knowing that students from rural communities are more likely to return to a rural area to practice and understanding the need to increase the pipeline of rural students enrolled in Georgia medical schools, it was determined that students from the 38-county region needed to become more competitive in the application process. This year, PPMH hosted eleven Pathways to Medicine Students.

To determine how to make the students more competitive, AHEC polled the admissions committees from each of the medical schools in Georgia to determine what, beyond MCAT scores and GPA would increase their chances of being accepted. The overwhelming consensus was a much needed and significant structured clinical shadowing and medical research experience. The Albany based Pathway to Medical School Program was structured accordingly as a 4-week residential experience to include 50 hours of clinical shadowing in a primary care setting and 75 hours of community-based research to include data collection, interpretation, and presentation.

Southwest Georgia is a medically underserved area (MUA) and by supporting the efforts of local aspiring medical students at the pre-med academic level, we can improve access to healthcare in our communities.

h.Colony Bank Leadership Academy:

The Colony Bank Leadership Academy aims to encourage high school juniors to recognize their own potential and develop their leadership skills. As part of the curricula, 43 students attended a day in the Simulation Center to participate in hands on skills (such as listening to heart tones and respirations) to educate them on medical skills and careers in hopes of encouraging them to seek a career in healthcare.

i.Junior Leadership Lee:

Junior Leadership Lee County draws together rising high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors who are deeply committed to our future and empowers them with the essential knowledge about every element of our community - from government, healthcare, and education to news, history, and charity. As part of the curricula, 24 students attended a day in the Simulation Center to participate in hands on skills (such as listening to heart tones and respirations) to educate them on medical skills and careers in hopes of encouraging them to seek a career in healthcare. Dr. Tracy Suber facilitated their session regarding communication.

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j. Various Community Leaders and Organizations:

i. During 2025, PPMH began hosting hands on training and demonstrations for non-medical community members to step into the life of a health care professional. Five of these events were hosted this year at the PPMH Simulation and Innovation Center.

ii. PPMH hosted multiple other community organizations in its simulation center and provided hands on opportunities to experience medical skills training. Over 400 individuals from around the community and state attended such events, more than 10 of such events were held.

iii. PPMH hosted 9 high school and one middle school events covering hands-on training and demonstrations that allow the non-medical community member to step into the life and training required of our staff. Activities include: IV skills, tourniquet placement, heart, lung, listening to bowel sounds, pulse point checks and virtual reality health care simulation.

C. Coalition Building

In 2025, Phoebe made the decision to pay for each employee to volunteer in the community for a maximum of four hours annually. This is a voluntary opportunity, and employees are able to participate as their workload allows. There were 382 employees that volunteered for 17 events during fiscal year 2025. Some of the events that were held are as follows including persons served:

-MLK Day of Service - 23 employees participated providing 45 hours of time.

Packed and distributed 650 crates of fresh produce in Americus and Albany.
-Camp Good Grief - 27 volunteers, totaling 162 hours of time. Supported 53 children coping with loss, helping them navigate their grief journey.

-Salvation Army - 9 employees, totaling 26 hours of time. Served food to 30 individuals and cleaned several rooms.

-Feeding the Valley - 48 employees participated providing 100 hours of time. Packed 19,500 pounds of food, providing 46,913 healthy meals for the community.

-Sumter Fuller Center for Housing - 48 employees, totaling 331 hours of time. Designed, constructed and painted a home for a mother and her 7 children.

-Men's Health Fair - 67 employees, totaling 252.5 hours of time. Supported health screenings for 185 participants, including cholesterol and PSA tests.

Partnership with The Arc of Southwest Georgia

PPHS entered into an employment partnership with The Arc of SWGA that advances employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities. The program is unique in that it is a business-led, transition-to-work program, with training taking place entirely at PPMH. The anticipated outcome for each participant is competitive employment. This means employment in an integrated setting, working alongside coworkers with and without disabilities, year-round work that is not seasonal employment, and 15 or more hours per week at a wage of \$15.00 per hour or higher. During 2025, Phoebe expanded the partnership to include hiring individuals with disabilities from Easter Seals. In all, there were 5 individuals hired in positions as food service workers, certified nurse assistants, groundskeeping, and patient transport.

VI. Community Benefit Operations

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The Corporation incurred \$180,233 to support community benefit operations. Of this amount, \$73,533 was for dedicated staff to assist with grant management and administration for health and community benefit programs. The Corporation also provided \$106,700 for grant reporting and recording software, data management and community dashboard that displays over 180 community health indicators on its website:
